Taking to heart the last words of the Lord Jesus, we will go into the world to proclaim the Good News to the whole of creation.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Amadeus (not Mozart!) was a famous violin teacher. He knew his music and had a gift for being able to bring out the best in his pupils. At one time four pupils were sent to him. He saw that each one of them had great talent and this excited him. He wanted to make them even better. It was a great opportunity for them.

The first pupil was called Mary. She had only just started her music lessons when her friends began to pester her. They would come knocking at her door, begging her to come out and play. After a while, she gave in, and that was the end of her music lessons. Amadeus was sorry to see her go.

The second pupil was called John. The idea to take music lessons had come from his parents. He felt forced into it and so, his heart was not in it. Still, for a while, it was exciting to hear the sound of the violin. But soon the novelty wore off. It was just too much hard work and so he gave up. And Amadeus was sorry to see him go.

The third pupil was called James. He was multi-talented. He particularly liked athletics and football but was anxious to cultivate all his interests. For a while he succeeded. But eventually something had to suffer. It was the music lessons. First he began to fall behind, then to neglect them, and finally he dropped them altogether. Amadeus was sad to see another of his pupils go.

The fourth was Anne. She was by no means the best of the four, but she really wanted to succeed. Right from the start, she put her heart and soul into all the lessons. Even so, there were times when practising got boring, and she would have preferred to be out playing with her friends. But she stuck to her lessons, and in the end graduated with first class honours. Amadeus was delighted for her.

Does this story remind us of anything? Hopefully it will remind us of today's Gospel. The Word of God is symbolized by the seed being sown on the land. It needed a good gardener – like Amadeus in the story – to help it to grow. But it also needed people who were prepared to persevere and allow it to grow inside them and bear fruit for God. All of us have been blessed with hearing the Word of God. But do we really listen to its message? Do we allow the Good News to grow within us? None of us can claim that we know Jesus unless we listen to his Word and unless we allow his Word to take root in our lives each day. In nature the seed has only a short growing season in the early part of the year. This isn't so with the seed that is God's Word. It can grow at any stage in a person's life. Some grains of wheat were found in the tomb of one of the kings of ancient Egypt. Someone planted and watered them. To the amazement of everyone, the grains came to life and began to grow, after 5000 years of lying in a tomb. The seed of God's Word, once sown into the human heart, never dies. And it is never too late to act on the Word of God.

Psalm Response Some seed fell onto rich soil, and produced its crop.

Gospel Acclamation Speak, Lord, your servant is listening; you have the message of eternal life.

Fatima Pilgrimage

It is a few weeks since we went on Pilgrimage to Fatima. It was a wonderful week. Everyone on the Pilgrimage seemed to really enjoy it.

After arriving in Fatima – via a flight to Lisbon – on the Monday evening, it was a little too late to do any pilgrimage sights on arrival. However some of us did venture out to watch the end of the Rosary Procession, which was very moving since there were 1000's of people there. Fatima does not get the same number of pilgrims as Lourdes, apart from around the dates of the apparitions and, of course, when Pope Francis is there! However, the Rosary Square is huge and the numbers of pilgrims who do arrive each day are dwarfed by the size of the place.



On one side stands the older basilica, where Lucia, Francesco & Jacinta, the three children who saw Our Lady, are buried. Francesco and Jacinta were recently canonized and enormous pictures of them are displayed on the outside walls of the old basilica.

Just near the old basilica is the Apparition Chapel, erected very close to the site of the place where Our Lady appeared to the children 100 years ago. In the Apparition Chapel can be seen the statue of Our Lady of Fatima; the crown which she wears is adorned with many jewels and also with the bullet with which Pope John Paul II was shot in St. Peter's Square in 1981.

On the opposite end of the square is a new basilica, which is adorned with a massive set of rosary beads which light up at night. Next to the basilica is a beautiful 80 foot depiction of the Crucifixion. It can be seen from miles around. It is truly an amazing place, very beautiful and very peaceful.



As our first day ended we joined with the Rosary Procession at night and felt the peace of being close to Our Lady in Fatima.
