Second Sunday of Lent.(B)

First Reading - Genesis 22:1-2.9-13.15-18

In the Book of Genesis, we listen to the story of Abraham's sacrifice of his son Isaac. This was a test of Abraham's faith in God who then made him the father of many nations. Abraham is seen as a great leader in many different faiths and religions throughout the world today.

Second Reading – St.Paul to the Romans 8:31-34.

St.Paul tells the people of Rome that God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for the life of everyone. The reading reminds us of God's great love for us by giving us his only Son.

Gospel Reading – Mark 9:2-10.

We hear the great story of the Transfiguration of Jesus on Mount Tabor. Jesus reveals hi godly nature whilst joined by Moses and Elijah, who represent the Law ns the prophets of the Old Testament. The disciples are told not to say anything about this until "the Son of Man has risen from the dead."

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GOSPEL REFLECTION.

Jesus had just begun his journey to Jerusalem. Up until this time he had been working mostly in Galilee. Even there, the area where he had grown up, he had met a lot of opposition from the religious leaders and the public at large. But in going to Jerusalem he sensed that a violent death awaited him. Naturally, he recoiled at such a fate. It seems that, to reflect on his situation, he needed time to prayer and reflect. So, with three of his disciples, Peter, James and John, he climbed to the top of Mount Tabor. Jesus had a marvellous experience on top of the mountain. He heard those words come from the cloud, "You are my Beloved Son, I am pleased with you." In other words, he knew that God the Father loved him. This assurance would give him the strength to face the future whatever the future held.

Sometimes, when we run into problems, our faith can fail us. Or at least that is what we think. We can think that God has abandoned u in our greatest need. But through prayer hopefully we will come to realise that God has not abandoned us, but is present in our suffering. At all times, but especially in those times when we are struggling, we should remember the words of St. Paul: "God is on our side." And with God on our side, we can face anything.

To know that nothing can separate us from the love of God is our strength in times of weakness and our hope in times of adversity. In the face of pain, all we have to do is abandon ourselves to his care. Like Jesus on Mount Tabor, we too can experience rare moments of light and joy. We get glimpses of the Promised Land towards which we are travelling in faith. In his love for us, God allows us to taste on earth the joys of the world to come.
